

HEALTH & HYGIENE

The consumer requires meat that is free of harmful bacteria and drug residues. Special care should be taken to observe withdrawal times for health treatments.

Effective cleaning and length of time between flocks are important in the prevention of infection from one flock of broilers to the next. Usually a house should be rested no less than two weeks between flocks.

Dismantle and remove all equipment from the house. Thoroughly clean and disinfect the walls and floors. Drain the waters as well as the water storage tank. Remove soiled discarded litter from the vicinity of the house where it can be buried, burnt, or composted for fertilizer.

Density Guidelines

Birds per sq. ft1 to1.2
Waterers (bells)1 per 100 birds
Waterers (trough)1 in. per bird
Waterers (nipples)8 to 10 per nipple
Feeders (pans)30 to 50 birds / pan
Feeders (trough)2 in. per bird
